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Some children and parents look at LEGO as building sets and nothing more. They build a set and that is all there is. After some hard play or frustrated parents picking up models and tossing them in the toy box parts get separated and eventually it becomes extremely difficult to put the model back together again.

Don't think of this as a ruined toy, think of this as an opportunity to add to your free build collection. LEGO's roots are in free play. What this means is the child uses their imagination together with a pile of LEGO Bricks to build something fun and unique. That is one of the wonderful things about LEGO, it is infinitely recyclable. One moment you have a car, then those same parts can be repositioned and a few moments later you have a plane, spaceship, or a boat. All without having to spend money on each of those toys individually.

With LEGO your child can have a new toy every day of the year.

Who am I?

My name is Eric Kingsley I am 40 years old and I have been an adult LEGO fan for over 11 years. I currently have a 9 year old son and a 7 year old daughter. Both are huge LEGO fans in their prime LEGO building years.

I helped to form the New England LEGO Users Group back in 1999. NELUG is an adult LEGO group. We have over 60 paid members and have public displays at shows throughout New England.

Being an adult builder I enjoy the hobby in different ways then children but being a parent of 2 LEGO maniacs I have many of the same frustrations that you do and sometimes more.

My collection is sorted by individual part type to make it easier to find parts. My kids love this and in turn enjoy building with dads bricks over their own which tends to "unsort" my LEGO quite quickly.

They also have trouble keeping LEGO off the floor and we constantly are having "Pick up dads LEGO area" sessions which usually involve throwing all the brick in a bin to be sorted later by me.

What do I think I can do for you?

I see LEGO from many angles as a fan and as a parent. I have seen things that work and things that don't. Not every idea I have or suggestion will work for you and your child

but our hope is to find ways to better manage your child's collection as well as stimulate them to use their imaginations.

Long term family building projects can be a great way to bond as a family. I have many ideas to make this work. The biggest challenge is giving kids small chunks so they can see progress and have fun without getting board and losing interest.

Often as children get older there is a time where they feel their only LEGO outlet is through robotics. While this is a fantastic product not every child is interested in robotics. Some may be more interested in architecture or sculpting in a different medium. They need to be encouraged and not made to feel like LEGO is off limits because it is a child's toy.

I will also offer a question and answer facility where we can all learn from each other's challenges. You may have an issue about organizing your child before they build that brand new \$100 castle. Or you may want to find a way that allows you to efficiently pick up the LEGO without dissuading your child from using LEGO.

We all love our children and LEGO is a fun and very educational toy. It is as relevant now as it was 30-40 years ago. If you still have some of the LEGO from your childhood lying around it still works with the LEGO of today. We all need to encourage our young builders while maintaining our own sanity. •

This is a nice small set with. The set comes with a lot of tools, a garbage can, a lamp, and a man lift of the truck. This gives this set a very high playability rating. Building the set was not terribly challenging but was fun. Not many repeated steps which can frustrate a young builder. I have a big problem with all the stickers LEGO uses on sets now. They are very difficult for little hands to apply. I understand it is a cost cutting measure but there doesn't have to be that many stickers.



LEGO Terminology

Sometimes official sometimes childish but now you know.

Studs: The cylindrical "bumps" on the top of all standard LEGO bricks. This is one half of the original clutch system that holds most LEGO parts together.



Tubes: These are the cylindrical "tubes" on the bottom of all standard 2 stud or wider brick. These are the other half of the basic LEGO clutch system.
